



GUIDE TO MAJORS AT YESHIVA COLLEGE: SOCIOLOGY

Choosing a major can be stressful, but it is important to understand that you can pursue almost any career regardless of which major you choose. While there are some exceptions, most entry-level positions simply require general transferable skills—those that can be learned in one setting and applied in another. Relevant experience through internships and activities is generally more important to employers than a major. It is best to choose an area that you find interesting and where you have the ability to do well.

What is the Sociology Major?

Sociology is the study of social relationships, social structures/institutions, and public issues. It focuses on relations among people, groups, organizations, classes, cultures, and societies. Through study in sociology, students gain an understanding of the social character of human life and of the impact of varying forms of social organization on human affairs. Students are introduced to the methods by which such knowledge is obtained and to the applications of sociological theory and knowledge. The discipline combines the scientific and humanistic perspectives in its investigation of urban and rural life, family patterns and relationships, religion, culture, intergroup relations, social class and prestige, criminology and deviance, mass media and communication and social problems.

What can I do with a Major in Sociology?

A sociology degree is excellent preparation for careers in law, criminal justice, social work, research, public administration, business, medicine, counseling, health care management, or other service professions. The faculty at YU offers expertise in criminal justice, public health, religion, medical sociology, research methods, the visual arts, and social psychology. Joint Programs

Social Work - B.A./M.S.W.

Stern College and Wurzweiler School of Social Work of Yeshiva University offer a five-year joint program. They are awarded the B.A. after the completion of the first year at WSSW and the M.S.W. at the completion of the program.
