New York Social Work Scholarships

[NYS Licensed Social Worker Loan Forgiveness External link](#)

Type: Loan Forgiveness

Amount: Up to \$26,000

Description: The Licensed Social Worker Loan Forgiveness Program is being offered to increase the number of licensed social workers working in critical human service areas or communities with multilingual needs. The maximum award under this program will be \$26,000. Awards will be paid in annual disbursements for each period of qualified service.

[James F. Reville Scholarship External link](#)

Type: Scholarship

Amount: Two \$3,000 awards are presented annually in \$750 installments to individuals enrolled in full-time institution in field related to intellectual and developmental disabilities

Description: James F. Reville dedicated much of his life to bettering the lives of people with developmental disabilities. He was president of the Welfare League Chapter from 1963 to 1964 and of NYSARC from 1965 to 1969. He was a member of the organization's board of directors for several years and served as the chairman of the ways and means committee for the National Association for Retarded Children in 1970. Gov. Nelson Rockefeller appointed Reville to the Advisory Council on Mental Retardation Facilities and to the Developmental Disabilities Council.

[New York City Board of Education Bilingual Scholarship Program External link](#)

Type: Scholarship

Amount: Varies

Description: Applicants must be fluent in Spanish, Chinese, Haitian Creole or Russian (others, as determined by the needs of the New York City Board of Education), have a cumulative GPA of 3.0 or above, and be a U.S. citizen or have permanent residency status. There is a non-refundable application fee of \$15.00 payable to the New York City Board of Education.

Applicants must demonstrate proficiency in English and in one of the languages indicated above, and must take and pass several exams to demonstrate proficiency in English and the second language. Participants shall fulfill all requirements for and shall obtain state certification/bilingual extension. In exchange for tuition assistance, students must accept employment (two-to-five years) with the New York City Public School System after graduation. To work within the Board of Education, you must be licensed by the State Education Department and NYC Board of Education. The scholarships cover the full cost of tuition (excluding fees) and can be used for full- or part-time matriculated study. As a matriculated student, the applicant can apply for the Federal Student Loan Programs to cover other fees not paid by the Board of Education. Awards are made on a semester basis and are ongoing, depending on the availability of funds. For application, contact the New York City Board of Education.

Amount: \$1,000 to \$5,000

Description: This trust was established to help students entering the fields of nursing, medicine, or social work, who may not otherwise be able to attend college due to financial circumstances. Applicants must be New Hampshire residents, already in the process of post-secondary education, who can demonstrate both financial need and academic excellence. Submit applications to Alice M. Description: The American Cancer Society offers this scholarship to students in the second year of their master's degree study who are working with cancer patients.

[American School Health Association Scholarship External link](#)

Amount: \$250

Description: Current ASHA members pursuing either undergraduate or graduate studies can apply for this award. Applicants must have a declared major related to one of the following areas of specialization: PreK-12 Health Education, PreK-12 Physical Education, School Nursing, School Counseling, School Social Work, PreK-12 Student Support, Pediatric or Adolescent Medicine or Dentistry. Applicants must include a letter from current employer, a 2-3 page double spaced personal statement, two letters of recommendation, a current transcript and application form.

[American Society on Aging \(ASA\) -- Graduate Student Research Award External link](#)

Amount: \$500

Description: The ASA annually confers their Graduate Student Research Award to the best unpublished graduate research paper on a completed project relevant to aging and applicable to practice. The winner receives a \$500 cash prize, an opportunity to present their paper at the Aging in America conference and a complimentary one-year student ASA membership.

Amount: \$4,000

Description: Up to 10 scholarships of up to \$4,000 each are awarded to master's degree candidates in social work who have demonstrated an affinity with or commitment to working with, Hispanic/Latino and

American Indian/Alaska Native populations. Students must be a NASW member and have applied to or been accepted to an accredited MSW program. In addition, students must have over a 3.0 GPA.

Davis-Putter Scholarship Fund [External link](#)

Amount: Up to \$10,000

Description: The Davis-Putter Scholarship Fund provides grants to students actively working for peace and justice and living in the United States. These need-based scholarships are awarded to those able to do academic work at the university level and who are part of the progressive movement on their campus and in the community. The exact amount of the award is determined by circumstance and the amount of funding available.

Fund for Lesbian and Gay Scholarships (FLAGS)

Amount: Varies

Description: This fund provides financial assistance to gay, lesbian, and bisexual students involved in the community. The scholarship amount varies and depends on financial need. The deadline is mid-September for the current school year. The Hooyman Intergenerational Fellowship [External link](#)

Amount: \$1,000 -- \$2,000

Description: The Hooyman Intergenerational Fellowship is a merit-based scholarship for students committed to working with older adults and their families within a multigenerational context. Award amounts depend on the number of qualified applicants. Funded students must complete the Multigenerational Concentration and their advanced field placement where they have opportunities to work with older adults.

Jane B. Aron Doctoral Fellowship

Amount: Varies \$17,900

Description: SOCIAL WORK HEALS is a collaboration between the NASWF and the CSWE to provide

a grant to one deserving **doctoral fellow**. The candidate's dissertation must focus on health policy and practice, and diversity components are encouraged. Of the award amount, \$15,500 will be disbursed directly to the university of the recipient with an additional \$2,400 set aside for conferences and leadership development.

The Leopold Schepp Foundation [External link](#)

Amount: Varies

Description: The foundation offers scholarships to U.S. citizens enrolled on a full-time basis. Awards are given to those under forty years of age pursuing a graduate degree. Applicants must demonstrate financial need.

National Association of Junior Auxiliaries, Inc. Graduate Scholarship Program [External link](#)

Amount: Various

Description: Applicants must be working or planning to work directly with children and pursuing graduate level studies for one year in fields which address the special needs of children and youth. Scholarships are NOT awarded for graduate work in administration or general education. Applicants must also be a U.S. citizen and a permanent resident of a state with a Junior Auxiliary Chapter: Alabama, Arkansas, Florida, Louisiana, Mississippi, Missouri, Tennessee, or Texas.

The National Italian American Foundation (NIAF) [External link](#)

Amount: Varies

Description: The NIAF will award scholarships and grants to Italian American students, or students with one Italian descent, who demonstrate outstanding potential and high academic achievements. The awards will be made on the basis of academic merit and divided between two groups of students. Applicants must have a minimum GPA of 3.5.

Patty Gibbs-Wahlberg Scholarship [External link](#)

Amount: \$1,000, \$2,000 and \$3,000

Description: The Patty-Gibbs Wahlberg Scholarship is presented by the Phi Alpha Honor Society for Social Work and is awarded for student scholarship, service and leadership. The first-prize winner also

receives an all-expenses paid trip to present their work during the Association of Baccalaureate Program Directors conference.

Amount: Varies

Description: The Point Foundation provides financial support, mentoring, and hope to meritorious students who are marginalized due to sexual orientation, gender expression, or gender identity. The application is open to all LGBT students nationwide regardless of level of education.

The Roothbert Fund, Inc. [External link](#)

Amount: \$2,000-\$3,000

Description: The Roothbert Fund provides scholarships for persons who are motivated by spiritual values and who can demonstrate financial need.

Sons of Italy Leadership Grant [External link](#)

Amount: \$4,000 -- \$25,000

Description: Through the Sons of Italy Foundation (SIF) and more than 650 state and local lodges, the Order Sons of Italy in America (OSIA) has awarded nearly \$61 million in scholarships to date to U.S. citizens of Italian descent (at least one Italian or Italian American grandparent) enrolled in an undergraduate or graduate program at a four-year, accredited academic institution during the fall term. Previous SIF scholarship winners are not eligible. Additional eligibility requirements may apply to specific scholarships.

The Verne LaMarr Lyons Memorial Scholarship [External link](#)

Amount: Up to \$5,500

Description: This scholarship is offered by the National Association of Social Workers (NASW) for one academic year to a Master of Social Work degree candidate who demonstrates an interest in or has experience with health/mental health practice and has a commitment to working in the African American community.

Social Work Scholarships for Minority Students

[American Indian Graduate Center \(AIGC\) External link](#)

Amount: \$500-\$5,000

Description: Graduate fellowships are offered for American Indian and Alaskan Native students. AIGC awards range from \$500-\$5,000 based on unmet need. Applicants must be pursuing a master's or doctorate degree as a full-time student. For an application contact AIGC at 3701 San Mateo, NE, #200, Albuquerque, NM 87110.

Amount: \$500 each

Description: Two book scholarships are awarded each academic year to students who demonstrate a commitment to work for social justice and equity in social work. Applicants must be in their last year of study in a bachelor's or master's degree program in social work accredited by CWSE. Applicants must have a GPA of at least a 3.0 on a 4.0 scale, be a full-time student, demonstrate a commitment to equity and social justice and be American citizens, non-citizen nationals or have permanent residence status. Priority will be given but not limited to minority ethnic/racial individuals.

[Hispanic Scholarship Fund \(HSF\) External link](#)

Amount: \$500-\$5,000

Description: Student must be of Hispanic or Latino heritage, and have a minimum 3.0 GPA. Student must be a U.S. citizen or legal permanent resident pursuing their first graduate degree, and must complete the Free Application for Federal Student Aid (FAFSA). Each HSF scholarship and grant may also have its own specific requirements. Scholarships are available for both undergraduate and graduate students.

[Indian Health Services – Health Professions Program External link](#)

Amount: Varies

Description: The Health Professions Scholarship Program is for American Indian and Alaska Native students who are members of their Tribe (federally recognized only), enrolled in a Master of Social Work

degree program. Students incur service obligations and payback requirements on acceptance of funding from this program. Health Professions Scholarships are awarded for a one year period (12 months of support), with re-application required for each year of continuation.

[NAACP Jackson Graduate Fellowship Program External link](#)

Amount: Up to \$2,000

Description: This program of the National Association for the Advancement of Colored People (NAACP) provides \$2,000 stipends to members who are full-time graduate students. Applicants must be U.S. citizens under the age of 25. Scholarship options can be found on the [Poise Foundation External link](#) website.

[Jewish Community Center \(JCC\) North American Graduate Scholarship External link](#)

Amount: Maximum of \$10,000 for two years

Description: Recipients of this scholarship must be committed to a career in the JCC Movement and agree to work in the JCC Movement for two years after graduation.

[The Kosciuszko Foundation External link](#)

Amount: \$1,000 -- \$7,000

Description: The Kosciuszko Foundation provides tuition scholarships for U.S. citizens of Polish descent to be used for graduate studies in any field at colleges and universities in the United States, and to Americans of non-Polish descent whose studies at American universities are focused primarily on Polish subjects. Scholarships are awarded on a competitive basis for one academic year.

[National Association of Black Social Workers \(NABSW\) External link](#)

Amount: Various

Description: NABSW offers a number of scholarships to African American social work students, such as the Dr. Joyce Beckett Graduate Tuition Scholarship, the Selena Danette Brown Book Scholarship, and the Cenie Jomo Williams Tuition Scholarship. NABSW scholarships are for active, paid members enrolled

for full-time study at an accredited United States social work program. Applicants must be enrolled in the semester the award will be granted, be of African descent, have demonstrated service to the community, express a research interest in the black community, and have at least a 2.5 GPA.

[National Association of Puerto Rican Hispanic Social Workers \(NAPRHSW\) External link](#)

Amount: Varies

Description: NAPRHSW provides scholarship awards to first or second year full-time graduate students presently enrolled in a School of Social Work program. Applicants must be able to demonstrate a strong interest in community organization and community advocacy that could potentially impact the Puerto Rican/Latino community. Applicants should demonstrate financial need and proficient academic performance.

Navajo Nation Graduate Fellowship

Amount: \$5,000 -- \$10,000

Description: Navajo Nation Graduate Fellowship is established to provide financial assistance in the form of grant awards to eligible Navajo students wishing to attend or attending graduate school, utilizing the Navajo Nation Graduate Trust Fund. For all full-time graduate students, the award shall be a minimum of \$5,000 and up to a maximum of \$10,000 for nine to twelve semester credit hours, per academic year based on points system as outlined in the ONNSFA program policy and procedures. All graduate applicants shall provide to ONNSFA official academic transcripts with conferred degree and/or type of graduate degree granted.

[The Paul and Daisy Soros Fellowships for New Americans External link](#)

Amount: Awards are for up to \$25,000 in stipend support (not to exceed \$40,000), and 50 percent of required tuition and fees, up to \$20,000 per one to two years

Description: The Fellowships honor and support the graduate educations of 30 New Americans --- permanent residents, DACA, or naturalized citizens if born abroad; otherwise children of naturalized citizen parents --- each year.

At the time of their selection, fellows must be college seniors or early in the graduate programs for which they request support. Fellows can study in any degree-granting program in any field at any university in the United States, and are selected on the basis of merit in annual national competitions.

[UJA Federation — The Wiener Educational Center External link](#)

Amount: Various

Description: Need-based financial assistance offered to selected MSW students who are interested in working in the Jewish community in a career in Federation work. This aid is offered only to New York residents.

[United Jewish Communities Federation Executive Recruitment and Education Program External link](#)

Amount: Various

Description: Assistance is available to students enrolled in a graduate-level program that will earn them a master's degree in policy sciences, social work, and/or Jewish communal service and public administration. The student must hold a bachelor's degree, have a GPA of 3.0, and demonstrate leadership ability and communication and organizational skills. The student must commit to working at a North American Jewish federation for a minimum of two to three years after graduation.

[William Randolph Hearst Endowed Fellowship for Minority Students External link](#)

Amount: \$2,000-\$4,000

Description: The Nonprofit Sector Research Fund, a grant-making program of the Aspen Institute in Washington, D.C., annually offers the William Randolph Hearst Endowed Scholarship. The scholarship, which is based on academic excellence and need, is open to both undergraduate and graduate students who are members of minority groups.

Military Scholarships

[Post-9/11 GI Bill External link](#)

Amount: Annual stipends of up to \$1,000; additional financial aid varies

Description: The Post-9/11 GI Bill provides financial support for education to veterans. The bill currently pays tuition and includes an annual book-and-supplies stipend of \$1,000. The percentage of benefits received depends on the time spent on active duty. Eligibility restrictions apply. Yellow Ribbon Program [External link](#)

Amount: Varies

Description: The Yellow Ribbon GI Education Enhancement Program (also known simply as the Yellow Ribbon Program) is a provision of the Post-9/11 Veterans Education Assistance Act of 2008. This program allows American institutions of higher education to voluntarily enter into an agreement with the Department of Veterans Affairs to fund the tuition expenses of service members and veterans that exceed the highest public in-state undergraduate tuition rate. Montgomery GI Bill (MGIB) [External link](#)

Amount: Varies

Description: MGIB benefits are available for service members and veterans to help with education and training costs. There are two versions of the MGIB: one for active duty soldiers and veterans (MGIB-AD), and another for members of the Reserves and National Guard (MGIB-SR). Montgomery GI Bill Selected Reserve (MGIB-SR) [External link](#)

Amount: Varies

Description: The MGIB-SR program may be available to members of the Selected Reserve. The Selected Reserve includes the Army Reserve, Navy Reserve, Air Force Reserve, Marine Corps Reserve, Coast Guard Reserve, Army National Guard and Air National Guard. Reserve Educational Assistance Program (REAP) [External link](#)

Amount: Varies

Description: REAP is a Department of Defense education benefit program designed to provide educational assistance to members of the Reserve components called or ordered to active duty in response to a war or national emergency (contingency operations, which include the current Iraq and Afghanistan operations, and may include others as well) as declared by the president or Congress. The benefits

payable under REAP is a percentage of the Montgomery GI Bill Active Duty rate based on the number of continuous days served on active duty. Payments can be earned for 36 months after serving. Veterans Educational Assistance Program (VEAP) [External link](#)

Amount: Varies

Description: VEAP is available if you elected to make contributions from your military pay to participate in this education benefit program. Your contributions are matched on a \$2-for-\$1 basis by the government. You may use these benefits for degree, certificate, correspondence, apprenticeships, on-the-job training and vocational flight training programs. Depending on the number of your monthly contributions, you may be entitled for up to 36-months of benefits. Survivors and Dependents Assistance (DEA) [External link](#)

Amount: Varies

Description: DEA provides education benefits to eligible spouses and children of certain veterans. You may receive up to 45 months of education benefits, which may be used toward degree programs, certifications, apprenticeships and on-the-job training. Armed Forces Tuition Assistance Program (TA) [Top-up] [External link](#)

Amount: Varies

Description: Tuition Assistance (TA) will pay for some or all of the tuition costs of college courses that you take while on active duty. TA is a benefit paid to eligible members of the Army, Navy, Marines, Air Force, and Coast Guard. Active-duty members may choose to use the MGIB “top-up” in addition to their service-provided TA. The use of “top-up” allows for payment up to 100 percent of tuition expenses. TA benefits are separate from your GI Bill benefits and do not count against them. Eligibility restrictions apply. Loan Repayment Program (LRP) [External link](#)

Amount: Varies

Description: LRP is a military education benefit offered to members of the U.S. Armed Forces. The benefit helps service members reduce student debt incurred while taking college classes before joining the military. You must enroll in the LRP when you enlist in the Armed Forces. The U.S. Army, Navy and Air

Force each have versions of the LRP. The Army and Navy will repay up to \$65,000 of your qualifying student loans, and the Air Force will repay loans up to \$10,000. Eligibility restrictions apply. To learn more, visit benefits.va.gov/benefits/ [External link](#) .

Description: One of the world's largest sources of funding for women's higher education, the AAUW provides a series of fellowships and grants to women pursuing graduate studies.

Amount: Varies

Description: The Business and Professional Women's Foundation has a variety of scholarships and fellowships for women who are age 25 or over, are U.S. citizens, and are going back to school either to upgrade skills for career advancement, to train for a new career field, or to enter/re-enter the job market. Students may be full or part time, but must demonstrate critical financial need. Awards are usually in the amount that matches the applicant's need (average award is \$700). Applicants must be enrolled or accepted in an accredited program at the time of application.

Dissertation Grants are available for advanced doctoral students and are intended to support the student while writing the doctoral dissertation. Applications are encouraged from a variety of disciplines, such as but not limited to, education, sociology, economics, psychology, demography, statistics, and psychometrics. Awards for Dissertation Grants are up to \$20,000 for 1-year projects.
