We, as the Security Council, have been charged with the responsibility of “maintenance of international peace and security.”<sup>2</sup> Thus, we have a tremendous obligation to ensure stability among the international community. “With great power comes great responsibility.”<sup>3</sup>

This year the Security Council will be tackling two very different issues. One issue we will be examining is grounded in both philosophy and political debate. For our first topic we will be going back to the UN charter, the inception of UNEF, and the institution of R2P in order to examine peacekeeping.
