Payroll

The University processes payroll for employees on a bi-weekly basis according to the University payroll <u>schedule.</u>

Bi-weekly employees are issued their paychecks on Fridays, one week after the close of each biweekly payroll period. There is a one week lag between the end of a bi-weekly payroll period and payday. You should receive your first paycheck within the first two pay periods.

If there is a problem related to the number of hours for which you should have been paid, first check your timesheet with your supervisor, then have your supervisor call the <u>Associate Payroll</u> <u>Manager</u> at 212-960-5400 x5485. Changes on timesheets require the approval of a manager and/or supervisor.

The Wilf Campus is located in Washington Heights on the high ridge of Upper Manhattan. This is the area from West 181st Street to West 155th Street – bordered by Fort Washington Park and the Hudson River to the West; High Bridge Park and the Harlem River to the east.


Ten blocks from the northern end of Washington Heights, in <u>Bennett Park</u>, is a plaque marking Manhattan's highest natural elevation, 265 ft (80.8 m) above sea level and the location of Fort Washington, the Revolutionary War camp of General George Washington and his troops.

The best known cultural site and tourist attraction in Washington Heights is <u>The Cloisters</u>, a branch of the Metropolitan Museum of Art devoted to Medieval art and architecture.


